HAVE YOU HEARD THE ONE ABOUT ...?

Have you ever heard anyone say, “Did you hear about what happened to ‘Larry’?” Or have you been concentrating on a task and overheard “Have you ever heard the one about...?” If you are like most people, your ears perk up as you listen with anticipation to what will be said next. You purposefully listen to hear the answer to each of these questions. However, do we listen as intently if the question posed is “Have you heard about Jesus?” or “Have you ever heard what one must do to be a faithful servant in Christ’s kingdom?”

Our society has been slowly attempting to erode any reference to God, Christ or a divine code of conduct from our daily life. It is evident by society’s actions that Christ is becoming a low priority in their lives. It has been suggested the “In God We Trust” should be removed from our money. Courts have upheld removing the “Ten Commandments” and abolishing prayer from our schools. As a result, it is found to be strange when someone openly discusses Christ. We say we are a “Christian society”. In order to be a Christian, one must be a follower of Christ but still our society, in its attempts, never wants to hear any reference to Christ. Nevertheless, to be a follower of Christ Jesus, we must first know what He has required through a study of the teaching that He has given us through the Bible.

Most individuals are able to recite John 3:16 in the “For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life.” However, do you realize in order to believe in

Christ, one must hear about Him? How can we hear and learn about Christ if we are too ashamed to even hear any reference to Him?

We have been given several examples in the book of Acts of those who believed and became followers of Christ but only after they had first heard about His life, death and resurrection. In Acts 2:14-36, the Jews heard the teaching of Peter revealing unto them the Old Testament prophecies of Christ which were fulfilled by His resurrection from the dead. The Ethiopian eunuch heard such message of Christ’s death and resurrection with the assistance of Philip in Acts 8:27-35. Also, in Acts 10:34-43, Peter taught the same message of Christ’s ultimate sacrifice to a man named Cornelius. In each of these examples, the individuals were seeking God’s word to “hear” about our Savior. In addition, they heard about the great sacrifice that Christ gave for us before they believed and obeyed.

JESUS: FICTION, GOOD MAN, OR SON OF GOD?

Please begin by asking yourself: Is my perception of Jesus Christ truly what the Bible actually portrays or is my perception flawed? Do I really know who Jesus Christ was and is today? We will attempt through a study of His word to determine whether or not our perceptions of Jesus Christ are correct or in error.

There are many differing views of Jesus and His life. Jesus has been portrayed by Hollywood as evil, weak and even sinful. He never even existed according to some “religious” organizations. Still others believe He was a good man, but nothing more.

Historically speaking Jesus was a real person. Historical fact of such is found in the writings of the Jewish historian Flavius Josephus. Josephus wrote a work entitled The Antiquities of the Jews in approximately AD 93, less than sixty years after the death of Jesus. The following is a quotation from his writings in book eighteen, chapter three, part three (as translated by William Winston):

Now, there was about this time, Jesus, a wise man, if it be lawful to call him a man, for he was a doer of wonderful works, -a teacher of such men as receive the truth with pleasure. He drew over to him both many of the Jews and many of the Gentiles. He was [the] Christ; and when

Pilate, at the suggestion of the principal men amongst us, had condemned him to the cross, those that loved Him at the first did not forsake Him, for He appeared to them alive again the third day, as the divine prophets had foretold these and ten thousand other wonderful things concerning him; and the tribe of Christians, so named after Him, are not extinct at this day.”

As we can see from this factual reference of an outside historical writer, Jesus was a real person that performed many miracles thereby providing irrefutable evidence to men that He was Christ Jesus, the Son of God. In John 14:6, Christ stated, “I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except by me.” Jesus points out that all men must go through Him in order to see the Father. Jesus came to this earth for one reason and one reason only. To seek and save the lost (Matt. 18:11). He did not come to establish an earthly kingdom, but to establish His spiritual kingdom (John 18:36). His purpose on this earth was to die, be buried and arise from the grave conquering death and thereby establishing a deathblow to Satan. By conquering death through His resurrection, Jesus has shown us that we have something to look forward to after our physical life is over.

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“For everyone who asks receives, and he who seeks finds, and to him who knocks it will be opened.” Matt. 7:8 (KJV)

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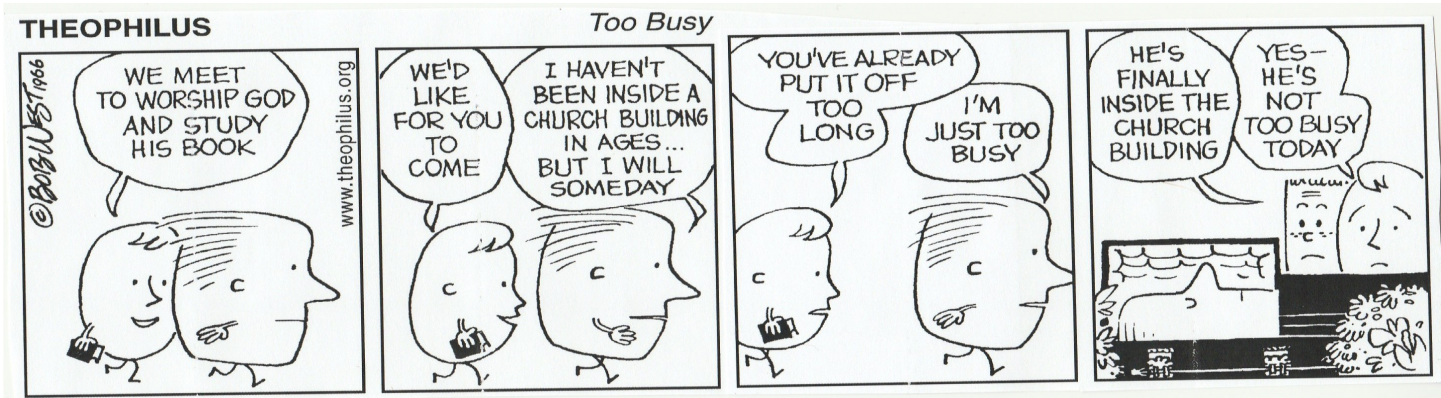
